But according to Freud, all dreams contain a "navel," a spot that defies understanding and "reaches into the unknown." In the Midrash, that unfathomable element in the lives of Jacob and Joseph is represented by Rachel, the "unknown woman" in their narrative. Literature, film and psychoanalytic thought will enrich our study.

HOUSES OF LIFE: JEWISH CEMETERIES OF EUROPE

The exhibition "Houses of Life: Jewish Cemeteries of Europe"— on display at the Herbert & Eileen Bernard Museum of Judaica through May 18, 2008—is based on the book of the same title written by Dr. Joachim G. Jacobs, with photographs by Hans D. Beyer. Senior Curator Elka Deitsch had the opportunity to conduct the following Q&A with Dr. Jacobs.

WHAT TRIGGERED YOUR INTEREST IN DOCUMENTING JEWISH CEMETERIES OF EUROPE?

I am a landscape architect, and my firm is specialized in the restoration of gardens, parks and cemeteries. Some years ago, the then head of our Berlin k'hilah [community], Andreas Nachama, asked me if I would like to design the extension to our post-war cemetery in the western part of the city. Working on this project, I got more and more involved into the general matters of Jewish cemeteries: their halachah [Jewish law], traditions and history. After the new cemetery was opened I was asked to work on the other, older cemeteries of Berlin. Over the years, we have been restoring the 17th and 19th century cemeteries and hope to work soon on the Wilhelminian cemetery of Weissensee, which is the biggest Jewish cemetery in Europe. While doing all this, I discovered that there was no publication on Jewish cemeteries that described their European history from the Roman period up to today in the way I thought it should be done... Houses of Life strongly being a reflection of the houses of the living and the ever changing conditions of Jewish life during the centuries.

WHAT WAS YOUR MOST MEANINGFUL OR INTENSE EXPERIENCE DURING THIS PROJECT?

Perhaps in a way, this was in Germany, in Mainz. There are the remains of one of the oldest medieval Jewish cemeteries in Europe. This 12th century site is next

to the train station, from where in Nazi times the Jews of Mainz were deported to the camps. The cemetery now is guarded by a warden who survived Auschwitz and came back to rebuild the city's *k'hilah* after 1945. To me this is an amazing picture of Jewish strength, survival against all odds and millennia-lasting continuity.

WILL YOU BE CONTINUING RESEARCH ON JEWISH CEMETERIES?

There are several plans that came up during the work on *Houses of Life*. One of them is looking beyond Europe at the cemeteries of "the rest of the world." This could include a wonderful chapter on Temple Emanu-El's cemetery in Brooklyn. Also, I am tempted to work on a book about the Jewish quarters of Europe. But first of all, I look forward to *Houses of Life* coming out soon and promoting it by future lectures and talks. I hope it will get a good reception in the U.S., after Temple Emanu-El made this wonderfully presented exhibition possible. Many thanks again for this.


