Rewarding gifts, far-reaching benefits

Nowhere is the confluence of American and Jewish values more evident than in philanthropy. In our faith, *tzedakah* is an obligation. At tax time, *tzedakah* is rewarded because our nation's laws continue to provide tangible incentives for charitable gifts.

Even in these challenging times, year-end remains a time for reflection and looking to the future. It also is a time when many of us are prompted to make important decisions about our charitable contributions. Through our donations, we seek to make a meaningful difference for institutions and organizations that matter to us. We at Temple Emanu-El urge you to make your gift to the 2008-2009 Annual Fund if you have not already done so and to add to your current gift if possible.

TAX-WISE GIFTS

Gifts of Cash: Writing a check remains the most popular and simplest way to make a donation. The Temple will benefit from the full value of your gift, and the government assists you, through a tax deduction, so that the cost to you is less than the value of the gift to the Temple. Your actual tax benefit will depend on the specifics of your tax situation. Don't forget that your membership dues also qualify for a charitable deduction!

Gifts of Stock: It is surprisingly simple to make a gift of securities. In most instances, stocks can be transferred electronically from your account into one maintained by Temple Emanu-El. Instead of selling investments that have increased in value, consider contributing them

to pay your Temple membership dues or to make your Annual Fund gift. In order to enjoy the maximum deduction for gifts of stock, you must have owned the stocks for at least one year and one day. Such gifts qualify for a tax deduction for the



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full current fair market value of the donated stock and do *not* incur tax on the capital gains. Be sure to contact your legal and tax advisors regarding how this can apply to your situation. If your stock has *declined* in value, then it is more beneficial to sell the stock, take the loss against your tax liability and write a check for your donation.

Gifts from IRAs: Several federal tax deductions, such as medical expenses, are linked to income. Keeping income down by making charitable donations from an IRA may benefit those looking to qualify for other tax deductions.



Rewarding gifts (continued)

Again in 2008 and 2009, the Charitable IRA Rollover is an option. This permits donors age 70½ and older, who are required to make annual distributions from their retirement accounts, to make direct contributions to charitable organizations without counting the distributions as taxable income—and, thus, avoid paying taxes on them. Such a charitable giving strategy is useful particularly for taxpayers who do not depend on their required minimum distributions for income and who also are interested in supporting meaningful charitable organizations. In addition, the rollover option also can benefit donors who have reached the charitable giving limit as a percentage of their adjusted gross income and those whose tax deductions decrease as their income increases.

BENEFICIAL GIFTS

Ultimately, charitable giving is much more than tax brackets and deduc-


