WEEKLY TORAH PORTION

Ki Teitzei

(Deuteronomy 21:10-25:19)
Read Saturday, September 1

Synopsis: Features 74 of the Torah's 613 commandments (mitzvot), including inheritance rights of the first-born, the wayward and rebellious son, burial and dignity of the dead, and returning a lost object. Also recounted are judicial procedures and penalties for adultery, for the rape or seduction of an unmarried girl, and for a husband who falsely accuses his wife of infidelity.

(Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8)
Read Saturday, September 8

Synopsis: Moses instructs the People of Israel, upon entering the Land, to declare their gratitude for all that God has done; reminds them that they are the chosen people; includes laws of tithes to the poor, blessings as reward for following the laws of the Torah and punishments if they fail to follow God's commandments.

High Holy Days at Emanu-El

WORSHIP SERVICES for the High Holy Days are conducted simultaneously in the Main Sanctuary (Fifth Avenue at 65th Street) and Lowenstein Sanctuary (10 East 66th Street). **Admission is by assigned ticket only.** Special notices about reserving seats for the High Holy Days were enclosed with the 2012-2013 membership dues statements. **Renewal of seating is not automatic.** Congregants needing seat assignments should contact the Temple Office immediately.

Congregants who do not receive their tickets by Monday, September 10, should call (212) 744-1400, ext. 210.

College students, both Temple members and nonmembers, who do not already have seats are invited to join us for High Holy Day services in the Lowenstein Sanctuary. Simply present a current college ID at the Beth-El Chapel entrance on Fifth Avenue on the day of the service, and you will be given an entrance ticket. The Beth-El entrance opens 30 minutes prior to the start of each service.

Read Saturday, September 22

Synopsis: Recounts the

last days of Moses’ life; includes transfer of leadership to Joshua, the writing of the Torah in a scroll to be kept in the Ark of the Covenant and commandment to gather during Sukkot; concludes with God saying that he will hide His face from the Children of Israel because they will break their covenant with God.

Haazinu

(Deuteronomy 32:1-52)
Read Saturday, September 29

Synopsis: Moses delivers a tone poem about the last days of his earthly life; encourages the Children of Israel to remember days past and how God granted them a bountiful land; also warns against the pitfalls of plenty and the calamities that will result; ends with God instructing Moses to climb to Mount Nebo, from which he will see the Promised Land before dying.

Coming from the Hebrew word for "forgiveness," Selichot involves the recitation of penitential prayers that are the work of medieval liturgical poets.

The liturgy and music of the Selichot service are intended to instill a mood of solemnity that serves as a prelude to the sacred themes of the High Holy Days. The Sephardic community recites the Selichot for the 40 days from the first of Elul (the month before Tishrei, the beginning of the Jewish New Year) to the Day of Atonement. The Ashkenazic community, on the other hand, begins reciting the prayers on the Sunday before Rosh Hashanah. In America, a late Saturday evening service has become the customary practice. A reception follows our service. **(No tickets are required.)**

Adult B'nei Mitzvah Program

TEMPLE EMANU-ELS Adult *B'nei Mitzvah* Program is for those who celebrated becoming *b'nei mitzvah* as youth but wish to reaffirm their place in Jewish tradition as adults, as well as for those who never had the opportunity to do so.

The class will include attendance at the Skirball Center's Hebrew Marathon on Sunday, October 21 and one evening study session per week for the 2012-2013 program year (held most Wednesdays, starting October 10). Each week's session will include both a Hebrew and a Judaica component. The Judaica section will include a Skirball class in the fall; the rest of the year, this class will be taught by Temple Emanu-El clergy and teachers. An hour of Hebrew, taught by Rabbi Posner, will take place each Wednesday evening, immediately before the Judaica class. The year will culminate in a ceremony in the spring 2013, at which each student will have the opportunity to read from the Torah in Hebrew. The date of that ceremony will be decided in conjunction with the students.

Does *Kol Nidrei* Get Us Off the Hook?

A Look at Making Vows in Judaism

How good is your word? If you make a vow or swear an oath, must you keep it? Can you rescind it? We'll take a look at *Kol Nidrei* and then take a short journey through a few biblical, Talmudic and Jewish legal texts in translation to discover the classic Jewish view of vowing and oath-taking. We'll also learn how *Kol Nidrei*, misinterpreted by anti-Semites, gave rise to the infamous *Oath More Judaico* in the Middle Ages and how this contributed to a modern consideration of whether to retain *Kol Nidrei* as part of our Yom Kippur worship.

What Is Sin?

Difficile Liberté (Difficult Freedom), a collection of essays that often is considered an excellent introduction to Emmanuel Levinas' intellectual *oeuvre*, includes philosophy, biblical and Talmudic commentary, as well as educational theory. One essay, "A Religion for Adults," originally was given as a talk at the Abbey of Tioumliline in Morocco in 1957. It clarifies (if anything in Levinas is clear!) Levinas' strong refrain that religion *is*, indeed, ethics. 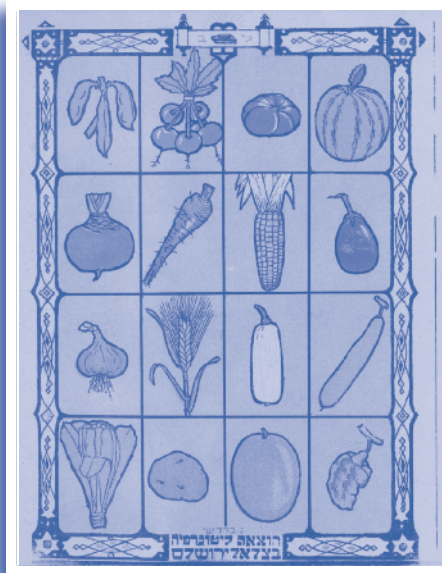

The lotto game for children pictured here, designed by Nehemia Bedarshi in 1915, features fruits and flora native to Jerusalem, including pomegranates (often used as “new fruit” for Rosh Hashanah), apples (dipped in honey for a sweet New Year), and the *etrog* or citron (part of the festival of Sukkot). *L’shanah Tovah!*
