of the Columbia History of Urban Life, editor in chief of the Scribner's Encyclopedia of American Lives and editor in chief of the Encyclopedia of New York, the first major reference tool for the city in almost a century. In 2001,



the New York Council for the Humanities selected Professor Jackson as New York State Scholar of the Year.



FROM THE ARCHIVES: MEN'S CLUB MEMENTOS

n affiliate of the National (now North American) Federation of Temple Brotherhoods since April 1923, the Men's Club of Congregation Emanu-El has been an active force in our synagogue life for more than 80 years. From the original affiliation certificate to various meeting minutes, the Temple Archives is replete with memorabilia that chronicle the history of the Men's Club.



For example, during the 1950s, the Men's Club highlighted its own activities as well as other Temple events through a variety of publications. Buffet suppers, father-son-daughter dinners and Purim festivals were regularly scheduled events. A list of guest speakers, ranging from composer Richard Rodgers to U.S. Attorney Irving Saypool, reads like a veritable Who's Who of the day. And, in March 1966, the Men's Club was given a troop charter by the Boy Scouts of America to promote "character building," "citizenship training" and "physical fitness." While the Boy Scouts troop no longer is in existence, the Men's Club does continue to offer important programs with prominent speakers and other services to Temple members today.


Sunday, April 17 10 a.m. What it Will Take to Win the War on Terror
